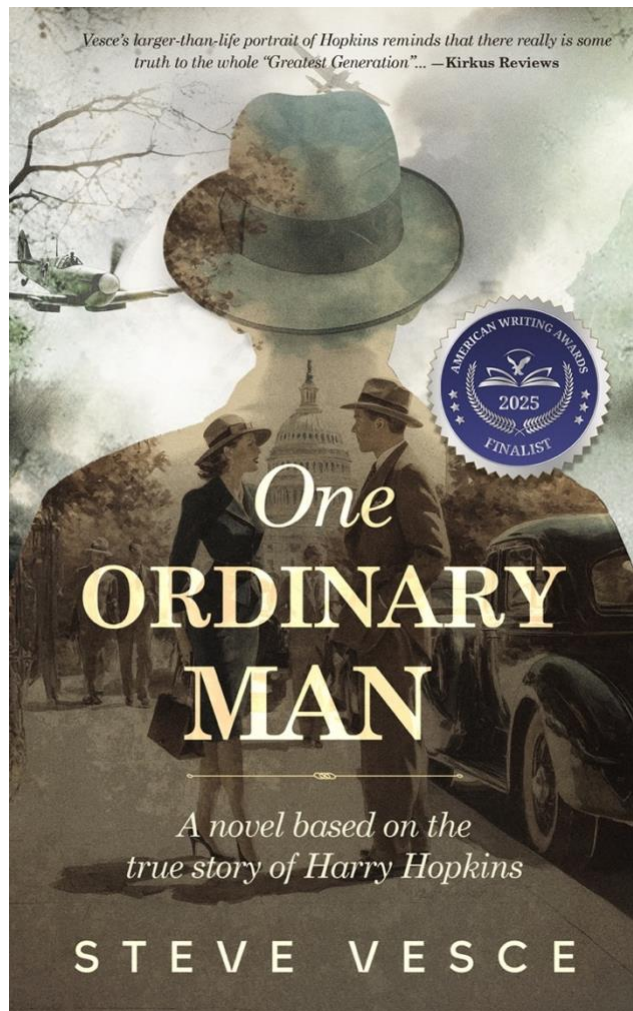

One Ordinary Man is the remarkable true story of Harry Hopkins—a man with extraordinary talent and grit, who journeyed from obscurity to a place behind the wizard’s curtain to pull the levers that helped America overcome the Great Depression, defeat fascism, and win World War II. Through Vesce’s richly detailed prose, readers live the times, private struggles and moral choices of the man who shaped a generation — and defined what it meant to serve. *One Ordinary Man*. One extraordinary destiny.

STORY SYNOPSIS (< 800 Words)

When Harry Hopkins, first arrived in Washington D.C. in March 1933 during the depths of the Great Depression, little did he—or anyone—know that he would be destined to play a pivotal role in the seismic events that would shape the future of America and the entire world.

True to his profession at that time, Hopkins created and ran many of President Franklin Roosevelt’s (FDR’s) innovative *New Deal* programs that focused on helping millions of Americans overcome the devastating hardships of the Great Depression.

Though disliked by some in Congress and the Press, Hopkins’ programs and straight-talking style endeared him to most. So popular was Hopkins and his programs, that after FDR was re-elected in 1936 in a landslide, FDR himself identified Hopkins as his heir apparent, and the best Presidential candidate to replace him in 1940.

Destiny, however, had different plans for both men.

Three months after Barbara Duncan, his wife, died from cancer, Hopkins himself was diagnosed with stomach cancer. Doctors at the Mayo Clinic surgically removed three quarters of his stomach and afterward he would suffer with malnutrition and debilitating illness for the rest of his short life.

With the time he had left, Hopkins worked to ensure the total defense of the United, though his own body fought against him the entire time he worked with Roosevelt and an array of world leaders. Despite his debilitating illness, as the world suffered from the devastating effects of fascism, Hopkins relentlessly battled to ensure the survival of America and its democracy.

Over the 12 years between 1933 and 1945, Hopkins grew from subordinate to advisor to colleague of FDR and his relationship with Franklin *and* Eleanor Roosevelt became one of mutual respect, loyalty, and trust.

On May 10, 1940, the day Winston Churchill was made Prime Minister of England and Nazi Germany invaded Belgium and France, the President asked Hopkins to come to the White House to discuss the issues confronting America and the world. Harry and his daughter Diana, stayed in the White House that night, and for the next three and half years.

Hopkins' proximity to FDR enhanced the special bond between the two physically challenged men. Having been viewed by Roosevelt as his capable successor, Hopkins maintained enormous credibility with FDR, and he was intimately involved in virtually every important U.S. decision leading up to and during World War II. Hopkins was in Roosevelt's White House office sharing lunch on Sunday, December 7, 1941 when they learned of Japan's attack on Pearl Harbor.

In January 1941, FDR sent Hopkins to England as his personal envoy to meet with Winston Churchill and determine if Great Britain would be able to survive the Nazi onslaught. Hopkins' fateful first meeting with Churchill sparked a deep friendship between the two men and an alliance between the two countries that would become the "special relationship" that defeated Nazi Germany and Fascist Italy, and inspired the development of democracy and the rule of law throughout the world for generations.

From the early days of World War II, Hopkins served as a member of FDR's War Cabinet, the head of Lend Lease, the Chairman of the Pacific War Council, and FDR's de facto Secretary of State at every major Allied Conference during World War II. From 1941 until the end of the war in Europe, Hopkins was FDR's eyes, ears—and *legs*—in meetings with virtually all of the world's Allied leaders, including Winston Churchill, Joseph Stalin, Chiang Kai-Shek, Mackenzie King, and Charles De Gaulle, among many others.

When FDR died in April 1945, just weeks before Germany's surrender and two months after the Yalta Conference, Harry Hopkins was viewed by many as the most powerful man in the United States and the world.

Hopkins' final official act for the United States occurred when shortly after Roosevelt's death, President Harry Truman asked him to visit Joseph Stalin and convince the Soviets to join the newly formed United Nations and to allow Poland to form a new free government. Despite his ill-health, in June 1945, Hopkins traveled to Moscow with his third wife, Louise Macy and returned with

Stalin's agreement to join the United Nations and to allow Poland the right of self-determination. President Harry Truman gave Hopkins the Distinguished Service Medal after he resigned from the government and before he returned to New York City.

The last letter Hopkins wrote was to his friends, Winston and Clementine Churchill, and the last words he uttered were to his wife. He said, *"You can't beat destiny."*

Harry Hopkins died in a New York City hospital on January 29, 1946, just nine months after FDR. He was 55 years old.
